MOVIE NIGHT ON THE GREEN OUTLINE FROM CHELSEA HEWITT. 3/9/23

Hi Eileen,

So I use an inflatable screen, I got mine from wayfair at the time but Amazon and Walmart carry them now too for a couple hundred dollars. I had originally bought a cheap fabric screen from Amazon and built a frame from pvc but the inflatable screen is SO much easier and worth the money.

The projector is a huge cost because you want something with a lot of lumens to see the images better and more crisply. Especially if you start before it's pitch black out or have any ambient lighting at your location. I don't know what kind of resources you have in Wheelock but our library and school both have projectors so that may be something you could look into as far as borrowing one. Otherwise the cost for a decent projector will run you around \$500 or so. Mine has 2000 lumens, I don't know the brand off the top of my head but I can grab it out of storage and look later.

I buy and download the movies directly to my computer, trying to stream off wifi is not reliable. I connect to the projector via HDMI cable and I rear project from behind the screen so it's not in the way out front. You can also run off a dvd player via hdmi cable the same way.

For sound I use a dj set I bought on Amazon which has been great, we use it for chamber events and other stuff around town but it's something you could also look into borrowing. Alan Towle here in Danville used to do our sound early on. Some of the local schools and churches have amps or speakers for borrowing as well.

Now technically you need a license to show these movies, if you are just doing it as a small community event and aren't widely advertising you can probably get away with it but Disney is sue happy so there is always a chance you could get in trouble. You can buy licenses through Swank, this is where I buy most of mine - they have all the major players. The newer the movie the more expensive the license is. I've paid up to \$300.

I serve free popcorn and I put out a donations jar so restock my popcorn fund. I did buy a large movie style popcorn popper but again a lot of places locally have one so you could potentially borrow from someone.

If I can get my act together I will also have baked goods for sale. Brownies and oversized cookies do well. A local group could use it as a bake sale opportunity if they wished. I set up a 10x10 tent with a table or two and offer free water and popcorn and baked goods/lemonade by donation with suggested pricing.

You will need a good source of power. We run off the power at the town gazebo. I run to my tent and another to the movie equipment with a power strip and extensions cords, all outdoor rated.

I provide a trash and recycling bin, we don't generate too much so I throw it out in my own trash.

Since we are using town land I do have to get selectboard approval but that has never been an issue for me.

Attendance can be hit or miss depending on weather and the actual movie itself. Newer kids movies and Hocus Pocus near Halloween are our bigger draws. But parents with older kids love the nostalgic classics, goonies, sandlot, ghost busters, etc.

If you are interested in trying one, let me know and I'd be happy to help you get started and set up.
