Selectboard News and Notes

he Selectboard held a well-attended special meeting on March 28 to review the proposal of Paul Trudell, architect from Silver Ridge Design (Hyde Park), to address the **ADA** accessibility issues of the Town Hall.

Mr. Trudell presented a multi-page plan which includes a lift with a new entrance on the side of the building, repositions a stairwell to the basement, adds two ADA bathrooms (basement),

replaces the stage stairs with a ramp, adds handicap parking on both sides of the building, and other smaller modifications. Problems with the outside ramp could be addressed by adding a concrete pad and extending the roofline, but those options are not included in the plan.

A significant portion of the proposal includes excavating the building's back and west side to examine current conditions, and then plan a solution for the foundation crack and frequent water leaks in basement.

There was considerable discussion about how a new lift and ramp to the stage will reduce the floor space of the assembly area. Attendees who are experienced with setting up chairs, the voting areas, and the selectboard table for Town Meeting stated that a 167-person occupancy rate (allowed under the building code) was hard to imagine.

The estimated total for the proposed work is \$186,390, which includes a 20% contingency. The plan is to fund the project with a combination of the town's ARPA grant and other grant proposals—an Access Modification Grant (\$100,000) and a USDA Rural Development Community Facilities Grant. Both grant proposals will be discussed in detail at the upcoming public hearing and public meeting (see sidebar).

Wheelock's Mineral Springs

he Wheelock mineral springs were pretty much a local attraction until the late 1860's when health resorts were popular and cropping up all over Vermont.


Royal Winter teamed up with a Boston company to buy and spruce up the old Brick Hotel in the village (see map below) renaming it the "Caledonia Mineral Springs Hotel" for guests to partake of the "curing" waters.

Mr. Winter created a 14-page brochure touting the healing properties of the waters, with testimonials by notable Wheelock residents and patients from Boston. The enterprise caught on and soon generated a short-lived boom for Wheelock village and Mr. Winter.

He started a side business bottling and selling the waters, which was a costly failure. Cases of the empty bottles embossed with "Caledonia Spring Wheelock" sat outdoors for years.

H. M. Nichols of Lyndon Center, bought the whole lot, then resold them to other local Vermont businesses. The bottles proved to be of very poor quality and lawsuits soon followed, although they are collectors' items today.

NEK Broadband Project Update



heelock was one of the towns included in the NEK Broadband's (NEKBB) first construction grants. The project is securing an easement for an equipment cabinet in Lyndon before completing the designs to bring

service to parts of Wheelock in 2023. The plan is to build 9.26 miles servicing 119 premises, in late summer into fall, with service coming out of the Lyndon cabinet.

The new service will be fast, reliable, and accessible for every e-911 address in the 45 NEKBB member towns on the electric grid or with utility poles. By the end of 2024, portions of all the towns will have access to the service with the goal of universal service by 2029.



ARPA grant funds from Vermont Community
Broadband (VCBB) is focused on building the "backbone" for this
section, plus the conditional ARPA grant from the Town of Wheelock
will support the plan (with a 3:1 match from the VCBB and NEKBB).
